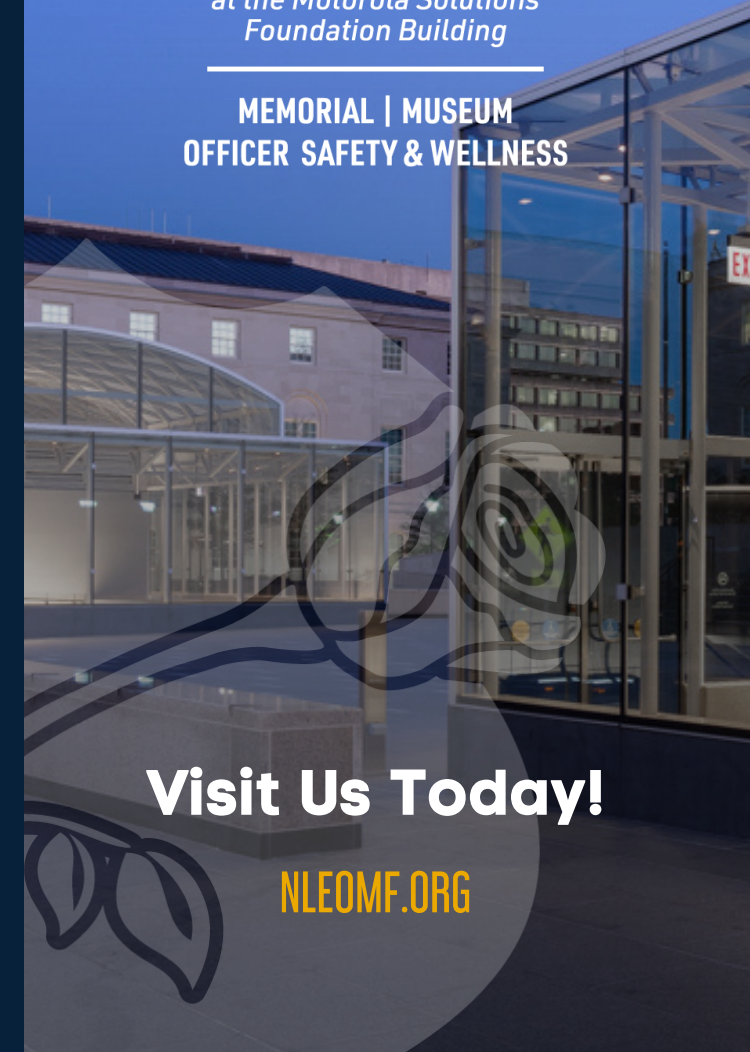

THE MEMORIAL

The National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, DC, is the nation's monument to law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty. Dedicated on October 15, 1991, this living Memorial continues to honor federal, state and local law enforcement officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice for the safety and protection of our nation and its people. The Memorial features two curving, blue-gray marble walls, spanning 304 feet that sit on three acres of federal parkland in Judiciary Square.

- The names of more than 23,000 officers who died in the line of duty are carved onto these walls, dating back to the first recorded death in 1786.
- New names of fallen officers are added to these walls each spring, in conjunction with National Police Week.
- The Memorial and the Museum provide various tools to locate specific officer names, including the website NLEOMF.org and the mobile app "The Badge."
- Special paper and pencils are available at the Memorial to create etchings of officer names.

HONORING THE STORY

The National Law Enforcement Museum is dedicated to telling the story of American law enforcement. Through educational journeys, immersive exhibitions, and insightful programs, the Museum aims to provide a deeper understanding of law enforcement's vital service to our country, and to expand and enrich the relationship shared between law enforcement and the community.
